• Bill Hexter, a professor in our department from 1953-1997, has passed away. Bill came to Amherst directly from his PhD at Berkeley where he studied with Curt Stern. He specialized in fine structure gene mapping in fruit flies. He shepherded the department as chair for many years and served as College pre-med advisor also for very many years. His genetics course with Tom Yost was very popular and his Drosophila research projects along with Phil Ives, research professor, inspired many students from the 50's and 60's who subsequently went on to prominent careers in genetics and molecular biology (including two future Nobel Prize winners). 




