

"Cuentos de sábado" is a program created by Daniela Nárvaez Burbano and Claudia Matachana López to serve the Amherst community since 2021. This collaboration with the Amherst Regional Public Schools fosters a space where families and Latinx students can engage in Spanish conversation and celebrate cultural differences. Twice a month, families gather for arts and crafts, games, and stories in Spanish at the Mead Art Museum. Children and parents can explore new experiences through literature and art.

During the Spring 2024 semester, students contributed to a new mural in the Newport Residence Hall. La Casa, the Latinx Cultural House at Amherst, collaborated with an organization consisting of artists from Puerto Rico, called Colectivo Moriviví, to design the project. Hear from recent alum on how they've continued to pursue Spanish after their time at Amherst.

Sika Essegbey '23 - English Teaching Assistant in Colombia



"My grant started at the end of July, and since then I've been an English Teaching Assistant at the Universidad de Cartagena. This semester, I am working with four professors and I also have 3 tutoring groups each week. Outside of the university, I volunteer with a local nonprofit called "Movimiento de Mujeres Negras y Barriales", that is dedicated to supporting black woman at risk of being displaced. Currently, I am in the process of translating a book they are creating that documents their progress over the past few years."

"I started studying translation at Amherst to learn how to write and ended up translating Julio Cortázar's story collection Las armas secretas as a thesis for the Spanish Department. After graduating in 2016, I worked with Professor Stavans translating Ricardo Piglia's The Diaries of Emilio Renzi for Restless Books. In order to further explore the possibilities of English and Spanish, I went on to translate works by several other Argentine authors, focusing mainly on creative nonfiction. I've also had several chances to use my Spanish during travel, including while walking the Camino francés across northern Spain in 2017 and 2019. Although I haven't used my language skills quite as much over the past two years while completing an MFA program in Chicago, the linguistic experimentation I learned as a translator continues to inform my work."https://www.rmcroll.com/translation

Dory Farlessyost - the Spanish Prize in Creativity

• This prize is given annually by the Spanish Department to Spanish majors and members of the senior class who display engaging, dynamic creativity and originality in the pursuit of knowledge about Hispanic civilization. The Department acknowledges these qualities through research, writing, class involvement, and extra-curricular activities.

Siobhán Ángeles and Conner Glynn - the Pedro Grases Prize for Excellence in Spanish

 This award was established by a member of the class of 1939 to honor a great teacher and cordial scholar. The prize is awarded each year to that senior(s) who has shown the greatest progress in the ability to read Hispanic literature with insight and to write and speak Spanish with intelligence and humane sensitivity.

Sarah Weiner - the Spanish Prize in Intellectual Merit

• This prize is given annually by the Spanish Department to Spanish majors and members of the senior class who have proven to be passionate, wide-ranging thinkers of Hispanic civilization in its multiple levels (political, social, cultural) and diverse geographical realms. The Department acknowledges these qualities through research, writing, class involvement, and extra-curricular activities.
