New Class: Department to offer Senior Seminar SPAN-495 Fall 2019

For the first time, in fall 2019 the Spanish Department will offer a capstone seminar to its graduating seniors. This class marks the beginning of a process to change the requirements for the Spanish Major. The seminar will replace the current comprehensive exam, and is meant as an opportunity for students to apply what they have learned throughout their time in the major in the form of an individual or group project. Students will meet twice a week and work under the instruction of Professor Paul Schroeder Rodríguez. The change will be grandfathered in, and current majors have the option to take either the seminar or the comprehensive exam. The new requirements are expected to be finalized for the Class of 2023.



Please Note:

This semester marks the last time that a SPAN-designated course will be taught in English. Starting in Fall 2019, all SPAN-designated courses will be taught in Spanish. Faculty in our department will still teach courses in English occasionally, but these will have the designator of the program that most closely approaches the course topic. For example, the course above, when taught in English, would be designated as only FAMS 238, while a course taught in English on Don Quijote would be designated as a European Studies Course.

Welcoming Elvira Sánchez-Blake for presentation "Memory and Peace Building: Women's Resistance in Latin America"


On April 3, we were joined by Elvira Sánchez-Blake, retired Associate Professor of Spanish and Latin American literature and culture at Michigan State University, and editor of Revista de Estudios Colombianos for a presentation in Stirn Auditorium. The lecture explored the expressive practices that women's groups have appropriated to build peace towards reconciliation in Latin America. In the discussion, she emphasized the role of Colombia's Women's Pacifist Route (Mujeres de la Ruta Pacífica) in raising awareness about women's rights through art, testimonials and performances. 
